This online platform aims to organize the pro-Israel community to work efficiently together via social media, thus creating a wide scale impact on the hearts and minds of global audiences. It allows organizations and their community leaders, as well as any individual activist, to be effective while feeling a part of something bigger – an Online Community for Israel. NETWORKING AND RELATIONSHIP BUILDING

Humans are social beings and, in almost all cases, the most impactful way of communicating, motivating, and relating is done within human networking. Social media platforms have given us a sense of the scope of possibility of networks but, unfortunately, digital networking has severe limitations. Because the art of interpersonal relationship building isn't as refined as in the past, there is a great opportunity for strong relationship builders to have a greater impact (as compared to their peers). This session will offer practical skills of how to effectively network with other individuals and how to make the significant connections deep and meaningful. We will explore this strategy in small scale and think about how to utilize this strategy on a larger scale.

START WITH HELLO: BUILDING RELATIONSHIPS TO CHANGE THE WORLD

In this interactive workshop, we'll learn and practice strategies to build thriving relationships, networks, and communities that can change our lives and the world.

THE IMAGINATIVE LANGUAGE OF CONSCIENCE: WHAT WE CAN LEARN FROM THE RIGHTEOUS CONVERSATIONS PROJECT

This workshop will look at the story of the Righteous Conversations Project (RC) and how one family's journey became a project that has travelled the world and touched thousands of lives at a precious crossroads moment in Jewish history, the closing chapter of the last generation of Holocaust survivors. Participants will watch several RC short films and PSAs (public service announcements) and explore group dialogue on issues of concern, meaning and import to group members. The group will explore ways that they can respond to contemporary issues of conscience with creativity and moral muscle. Participants will be asked to bring an object to share with the group that provides a window into a personal passion or concern. Group dialogue will support brainstorming to find ways to turn these thoughts and feelings into action in the participants many meaningful communities: Home, School, Synagogue, Nation.

THE WHY AND HOW OF SAYING THANK YOU

WORDS TO ACTION
